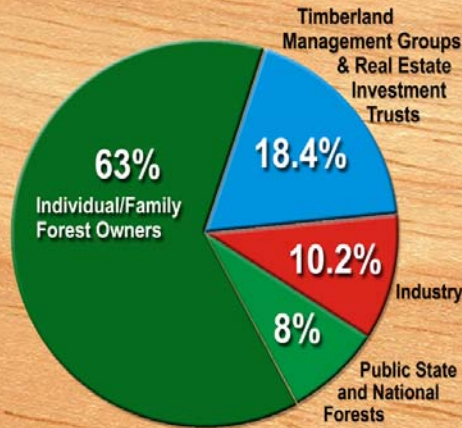

44% of Texas forests are Loblolly and Shortleaf Pine

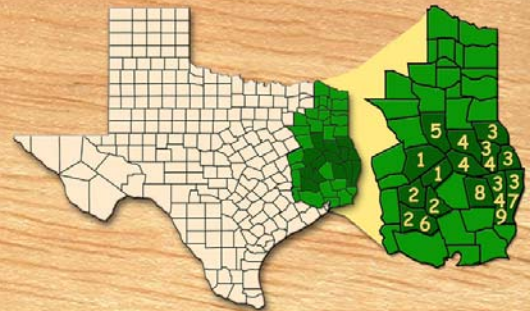
